Can you describe and/or demonstrate the specific impact that TFN funding has had against your initial objectives?	At the start of 2021, the 4 Centres had just brought their plots into cultivation of maize and beans using Conservation Agriculture principles. The improvements in yields and the resilience of the crops impressed local subsistence farmers and they then formed into groups around each Centres. Numbers rose from 10 farming families per CA farmers group at each Centre to nearer 20. Under the instruction of Patrick Walusansa, the project agriculturalist and with some financial help from FOAG, they have begun to practise Conservation Agriculture on their plots with encouraging results. The TFN funds enabled us to fund all costs for Planting Season 1 in 2021 and also enabled us supply a loan in Planting season 2 2021 to the CA farmers groups and the Centres to take part in a trial growing soya beans for a Ugandan Cooperative. Despite droughty conditions and Covid there is growing enthusiasm and a shift to more cooperation between the farmers and the Children's centres which is an important culture shift. Crop yields have sadly not met predictions because of drought in the last 2 seasons. Covid placed increased value on food security which has further motivated them to value their farming and CA methods as producing more resilient crops.
